In this newsletter, as well as some news, events and publications, you will realise how emblematic 2025 is for the history of the railway in the world!


We hope you enjoy reading this issue!

THE INTERNATIONAL RAILWAY HISTORY ASSOCIATION 9TH CONFERENCE SIENA (ITALY), 7-10 NOVEMBER 2024

Siena is one of the most beautiful cities in Italy. It is located south of Florence in the centre of the country. IRHA decided at the end of 2023 to hold its 9th conference, the first in Italy since the foundation of our association in 2002, from 7 to 10 November.

The conference took place on the first day in the historic Aula Magna of the Rectorate of Siena and the following two days in the Department of Political and International Sciences.

As many as 34 outstanding colleagues from 10 different European and non-European countries and from a variety of scientific disciplines sat at the speakers' table. Each session was followed by a lively discussion with a wide participation of scholars. It is planned to publish the proceedings with a prestigious English publisher, while the proceedings of the previous IRHA conference held in Budapest are forthcoming. The conference demonstrated the vitality of railway history in the world and contributed to the enrichment of its studies. Many young people attended the conference, which confirms how popular the subject is with new generations of scholars.

GERMAN RAILWAY MUSEUM OF NUREMBERG SIGNS A PARTNERSHIP AGREEMENT WITH THE JAPANESE RAILWAY MUSEUM IN SAITAMA

On 12 July the DB Railway Museum in Nuremberg welcomed a number of representing prominent guests world of culture, tourism, politics, to celebrate the partnership agreement signed between the German Railway Museum and the Railway Museum of Saitama in Japan. Among the guests, let mention the State Minister Housing, Construction and Transport of Bavaria Christian Bernreiter, the Consul General of Japan in Munich, Kenichi Bessho, the Mayor for Culture of the City of Nuremberg, Prof. Dr. Julia Lehner, and a delegation representing the Japanese Railway Museum led by Yoshiyuki Oba, Director of the Museum.

In the framework of this agreement, both commit museums themselves intensify their international cooperation and promote the further development of both museums thanks to mutual synergies and finally strengthen friendship between the host cities and host countries of these museums. In addition this partnership should contribute to strengthening international cooperation between the DB (German Railways) Group

and the Japanese Railway Company JR East which is supporting the Japanese Railway Museum in Saitama.

Actually, both countries Germany and Japan are "Railway nations", nations where the railway occupies an important position and benefits from a high status and recognition in the social, economic and cultural life. Railway Museums Nuremberg and Saitama already established international cooperation links on a number of issues including information exchange, loan of objects to museums for exhibition, organisation of international seminars or conferences,... In the framework of the newly approved partnership, these international activities should be intensified, among them joint projects for exhibitions and more focussed exchange of knowledge.

MINAS GERAIS' (BRAZIL) FIRST RAILWAY STATION WILL BE BACK IN OPERATION IN FEBRUARY 2025

The municipality of Chiador, in the Zona da Mata region, has one of the greatest imperial riches, a railway station dating from 1869 and inaugurated by Dom Pedro II. This postcard of a almost 3,000 inhabitants town has been under restoration for less than two years and should be finished between January and February 2025.

"It was in ruins, and Eletrobras took over the restoration of the building" (Maximina Maria Pereira Itaboray, municipal culture coordinator)

Maximina Itaboray explains that the interventions, as well as the investment

for the works, are the result of a lawsuit between the electricity company and the Minas Gerais Public Prosecutor's Office (MPMG) and the National Historical and Artistic Heritage Institute (Iphan).

The agreement compensates the construction of an energy-producing dam that was completed 12 years ago on the Paraíba do Sul River. This dam was installed in the neighbouring town of Mar de Espanha during the construction of the state hydroelectric company Furnas Centrais Elétricas S.A., and has a part in the municipality of Chiado.



The exhibition will be open to the public at the Palacio de Fernán Núñez, the Foundation's headquarters, from Monday to Friday from 9:00 to 15:00.




